1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya, Bongaigaon, a premier institute of higher education for women in west Assam, was established in the year 1993. The initial objectives of establishing this institution was to disseminate knowledge & skill to the women of nearby areas of Bongaigaon district. Located at the heart of the Bongaigaon town, the college is very well connected both by road and rail communication.

An institution of higher education solely for women was a long felt need of the region. This need brought together a likeminded group of Philanthropists led by Mr. Phani Bhushan Choudhury, MLA of Bongaigaon and sprouted a dream by the name of Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya. Thus, the college first started its journey in 1993 with just 50 students and 7 faculty members. But today the college has grown into an institute of excellence with more than 800 students and 34 faculty members. Though initially the college started only with the Higher Secondary classes, subsequently, later in 1995 it started the undergraduate courses in arts as Bachelor of Arts (BA). The college was accorded affiliation by Gauhati University and recognized by the UGC under sections 2 (f) and 12 (B) of the UGC act. At present the college offers UG courses in Arts both honours & regular. Apart from this the college also have study centres of Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University (KKHSOU) & Institute of Distance and Open Learning (IDOL) which offers various Under Graduate(UG) and Post Graduate courses through distance mode.

Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya provides a unique and ideal learning atmosphere to the students for their all round development. Though the college is located in the heart of the town most of the students of the college hails from surrounding rural areas. Since its inception, the college has been playing a path finding role for the women of the neighbouring areas and takes pride in its quality products many of whom are enjoying privileged positions today in different fields of the society. With a team of competent faculty members the college continues to work for empowering the women of the region.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

As an affiliated institution the college is bound to follow the curriculum prescribed by the affiliating university. However responsibility of delivering it to the students in an effective manner lies with the college. For implementation of the prescribed curriculum the college follow a range of carefully balanced strategic plans. Before commencement of each academic session, academic calendar is prepared followed by routine and syllabus distribution, preparation of Lesson plan, Field trips and Project etc. Each faculty members maintains teacher's diary as a reflective of the individual coverage of the allotted syllabus.

The institution follows a curriculum that includes several programmes incorporating in their respective courses and topics on cross-cutting issues related to gender, peace, human values, professional ethics, human rights, environment & sustainability etc. Apart from this, the institution makes every effort to sensitise the students towards these issues by periodically organising lectures & extension activities.

Study tour, field trips, visit to historical places are arranged from time to time to add an experimental quotient to the understanding of the students. Case Studies, group discussion, surveys and excursion provides hands on experiences. Structured feedback on curriculum from students and other stakeholders are obtained and new Strategies and Programmes are devised to address the issues.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching learning process is the most important thrust area for any educational institution. As the College is affiliated to Gauhati University it follows norms and reservation policy laid down by the university and the state government. Right from the admission to evaluation, the institution follows a well administrative and transparent procedure with ease availability of information on institutional website. To identify the slow and advance learner the institution conduct special learning assessment test and arrange for mentoring and remedial classes accordingly. Beside the usual lecture method the institution also organise various academic activities such as Quiz, group discussion, extempore speech, essay writing, speech competition etc. to ensure participative learning. Further with an aim of enhancing experiential learning and developing problems solving ability, the students are given opportunity of excursion, project work, and active engagement in workshop

training programme etc. The college adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA). Students are evaluated and assessed on continuous basis through innovative & reforms techniques such as sessional exam, assignment, attendance, group discussion, quiz, project and practical. The examination committee ensures that evaluation process remain transparent and student friendly with re-examination and re-evaluation whenever needed. The college has a carefully develop mentor-mentee process for providing all kinds of support to deal with academic and stress related issues. Apart from regular methods the teacher also incorporates ICT tools in their teaching learning method.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college understands the importance of research innovation and extension activities in the academic upliftment of both students & teachers. Realising the importance of research the college has formed the Research development Cell to develop the research culture and research sentiment among students and faculty members. Teachers and students constantly encourage to take up various social issues. Many faculty members have published their research work in different national and international journal. The curriculum of the different department has project work and field studies which helps to develop research sentiment among the students on various social issues. From time to time the college organises workshop, faculty development programme and lectures to motivate the faculty members towards research. The faculty members also participate regularly in various seminar, conferences, workshop and FDP at both national and international level.

The college through its NSS unit, literary & cultural forum & women Empowerment cell in association with different departments engages the students towards society responsible activities like community outreach programme in order to give the students greater exposure towards participatory & experiential learning. The college has also signed a number of MOUs with various colleges and training institute to undertake inter institutional cooperative/collaborative activities.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The institution has constantly been solving and upgrading its infrastructure to provide adequate facility for effective teaching learning. The college has one four storied & two two-storied building comprising sixteen classrooms including two ICT enabled classroom. The college also has one psychological laboratory, yoga centre, cutting and tailoring centre, spacious girls' common room, departmental common room, NSS Office, sick room and one Exam cell office. In order to cater to the needs of the students' the college has newly built a well ventilated and automated library with KOHA software (version 20.0507.000) with the provision of separate reading room. Moreover the college library has a subscription of e-journal, e-book and INFLIBNET. The campus is Wi-Fi enabled there by providing students & teachers easy access of internet facility. To ensure safety and security of the staff and students the college has installed CCTV both within and outside the classroom. Thus, the whole campus is under CCTV surveillance.

Student Support and Progression

Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya is committed to extend all kinds of academic, financial, Professional and psychological assistance to its Students. Students are provided both govt. and institutional scholarship and freeship. Being an all woman college the institution gives importance on the safety of the Students and hence

takes initiative to start a self-defence training programme. In order to help the students maintain good physical and mental health the college offers certificate course on yoga & meditation.

More over carrier and Psychological counselling training opportunities and training for competitive exam are done by experts from time to time.

The college has framed Grievance Redressal Policy and various committees, namely, Anti- ragging cell, Students Grievance Redressal cell, Anti Sexual Harassment Cell is in place to address the grievances of students.

Students union is an important platform for the students to understand and take up responsibilities, develop problem solving ability, administrative and management capabilities. Students representative are included in all the committees and cells including IQAC and editorial board of the college magazine 'TONOYA'.

The college also provides facilities for all round development of the Students through different curricular and co-curricular activities. Many of our students have also won a number of prizes in sports and cultural activities at both national& international level.

The Alumni Association of Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya is a registered body under Societies Act XXI of 1860 having its own guidelines. Alumnae are engaged in curriculum enrichment by providing their valuable feedback. Distinguished Alumnae are invited as resource person/ guest speakers/ judges for various college events. They also provide financial contribution for academic upliftment.

As it is a girl's college for the convenience of the students the college has the facility of a Xerox centre and a canteen within the campus. This helps the students in saving time and energy and provides the facilities of Xerox and doing any kind of online activity such as fill up and submission of forms etc within an affordable rate.

Governance, Leadership and Management

With a well defined vision & mission the institution makes dedicated efforts to provide quality education. The principal who is the apex of the administration in collaboration with governing body and other stakeholders works on the details of strategies & plans for maintaining quality education. The institution adopts participatory managerial principles with a mechanism for dedicating authority and providing operational autonomy. Different committees & cells are formed to look after various aspects of administration & management. The IQAC ensure effective planning & implementation of academic activities with regular monitoring and reviewing system. Welfare schemes are available for teaching and non teaching staff as per government norms such as NPS, GIS, Medical leave & Medical allowances. Performance appraisal system is followed for all permanent teaching & non teaching staff. External and internal audits are done regularly. For financial management and resource mobilization the college depends upon the grant from DHE, IOCL, Local bodies & individual. The IQAC undertakes quality initiatives for quality sustenance and enhancement among all stakeholders.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Being a women college the institution constantly takes measures to sensitise the students towards gender equity for generating inclusive culture. Keeping in mind the changing demands of the society the college is adopting

various innovative and student centric practices for the upliftment of the students. The students are encouraged to take active participation in various community centred program, Environmental Awareness and Protection program, Swachata Abhiyan, Awareness on health & hygiene of women and various such social issues.

The NSS unit of the college organise various program to celebrate **National girl child day, International Women's day, Environment day, World aids day** etc. Apart from this the NSS unit also organises special camps in the nearby villages to educate the village people about different social issues. **Blood donations camps** are also organised and encourage the students to donate blood for the cause of humanity with an aim of develop human values among them.

As an initiation of Green environment the College has initiated to conduct **Green and Environment audit** and **Energy audit**.

The college also has the provision of study tour and excursion for students to give them the benefit of experiential learning. To motivate the students for better academic performance the college has a provision of giving special award as **Principal's Award** and **Navajyoti Saikia Memorial award** to the topper of the University and the topper of the college in the UG final examination which contains a Citation, Memento and cash prize. Apart from this, the first class holders are also felicitated with a memento at a ceremonial function. As an addition to this, a very recent initiative is taken to select **B.A. Super 10** of Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya through a systematically planned examination process.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

<p>1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:</p>	<p>Being an affiliated college, Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya follows a course structure and the content for pedagogical transaction designed by the parent university,(Gauhati University). Since 2019 the college is following CBCS curriculum which focuses on multidisciplinary subjects having significant benefits and far reaching effects for the students. Students can opt for Generic Elective from other than their course study. In order to give students a wider exposure, college level invited lectures and conferences, seminars, special talks organized by departments give students a deeper understanding of other disciplines. However, the college is still carving out the ways for the fruitful</p>
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	implementation of multidisciplinary education which can enable the students to develop as envisaged by NEP 2020.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The institution's preparedness on implementation of ABC depends upon the guidelines of the affiliating university and Director of Higher Education, Assam. Under the prescribed CBCS curriculum being taught presently, there are credits assigned to papers and it allows students' mobility across higher education system and flexibility to experience diverse learning. The awarded credits are recorded in a system which leads to qualification. The credits are awarded on the basis of number of contact hours spend per week in different classes, along with the internal and external examinations marks.
3. Skill development:	The institution is already conducting skill courses as designed by the affiliating university since 2019. The college offers SEC in the curriculum for undergraduate students of 3rd, 4th and 5th semester students. The college has also started a certificate course on cutting and tailoring which will later be developed into a full-fledged vocational course. Apart from that the institution also has signed MoU with Medhavi Foundation and Skillfinity for providing training to students in skill development.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The college ensures appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system by offering MIL and core courses as per CBCS scheme set up by parent University. The literary and Cultural forum of the college organises some activities for promoting the art and culture of the region. Besides these, different workshops are organized from time to time to give students a wide and varied exposure to this.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The learning outcome of different programmes offered by the college is formulated by each department. The final outcome expected of students at the end of a particular programme and the desired skill and knowledge to be inculcated among students are framed out before hand. The outcomes are delineated clearly, and the teaching plans outlined accordingly. This enhances the quality of education being imparted to them. Furthermore, resources are shared through e- learning platform to augment teaching learning in classrooms.
6. Distance education/online education:	The institution has the provision of Open Education

through its study-center of KKHSOU (Krishnakanta Handique State Open University) and IDOL(Institute of Distance and Open Learning). This gives an opportunity of pursuing higher education to all those students who could not get it through formal institution.

Response:

Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya follows a pre-determined curriculum set by the affiliating university. However the college follows a range of carefully balanced strategic plans for effective curriculum implementation. The IQAC in association with Academic committee and the HOD's of different department makes strategic plans for effective curriculum delivery. Streamlining of the academic processes with academic calendar, time-table and syllabus distribution, pre-planned teaching plans is done by each department in co-ordination with IQAC and academic committee.

Institutional Initiative for Effective Curriculum Delivery Including Academic Calendar and CIE

- **Academic Calendar:** The Academic calendar is prepared by IQAC in accordance to the academic calendar of the affiliating university. The Academic calendar provides all information regarding the total working days, schedule of academic activities of the college, admission, internal assessment and end semester examination, National holidays, important and commemorative days and summer and winter holidays.
- The faculty members prepare their teaching plan according to the academic calendar.
- Different departments have taken initiative to prepare their own Departmental Academic calendar from the current session in accordance to the Academic Calendar of the institution.
- The examination committee also follows the academic calendar for conducting all internal assessment and evaluation.
- **Class-routine:** The routine committee prepares the annual routine based on which the HOD's of each department assigns workload to individual teacher as per classes and courses for teaching.
- **Teaching Plan:** Each faculty member prepares his/her teaching plan in advance according to the syllabus assigned to them. The IQAC collects Teaching plans of each faculty member at the beginning of the session for monitoring.
- **Teacher's Diary:** Each teacher is provided with Teacher's Diary where they keep the record of the days academic and other activities. The teacher's diary is monitored by the concerned HOD and the principal.
- **Course file:** Each faculty member maintains a course file including all necessary documents such as Vision and Mission, programme outcome and course outcome, syllabus, routine, teaching plan, results etc.
- **Course Completion Certificate:** Each faculty member has to submit a course completion certificate to the respective HOD.
- **Monitoring:** The Academic committee prepares polices and make strategic plans for successful implementation of curriculum and monitors all academic activities of different departments.
- **Prospectus:** The prospectus committee prepares the prospectus before the admission of new batch.

The prospectus mentions the programme, the course, academic calendar, time table, faculty strength and all other facilities available within the college campus.

- **Tutorial:** Tutorial classes are conducted for slow learners. Specific time slot is allotted for taking tutorial classes.
- **Use of ICT:** Teachers also use power point presentations, videos, Google classrooms etc for enhancing the learning outcome of the students.
- **Feedback:** The IQAC makes an effort to collect feedback from the student and other stakeholders, analyses it and takes appropriate measures based on the responses received.
- **Continuous Internal Assessment:** For smooth conduct of CIE the examination committee prepares the schedule of internal and end semester examination according to the guideline set by the affiliating university.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Response:

Being an affiliated college, Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya follows the Curriculum designed by Gauhati University and hence the role of the college in this regard is very limited. However, the prescribed curriculum addresses the above mentioned issues at various courses. Efforts are also taken to integrate the various cross cutting issues through the curriculum and supporting activities.

Professional Ethics:

The curriculum of Education, Political science and Philosophy has many courses which addresses issues relating to professional ethics. The curriculum of B.A. Education has incorporated a full course on Value and Peace Education, Great Educational Thinkers, Development of Indian Education and Quality, responsibility and Professional Ethics of teachers which directly addresses the issue. In Philosophy there is a course on Applied Ethics which addresses the issue of professional ethics.

Gender Sensitivity:

The curriculum of Political science has a full course on Human Rights and Political process in India which directly addresses issues of gender justice, gender exclusion and elimination of all form of discrimination against women. In education, a course on Emerging Issues in Education addresses social inequalities. Apart from this there are other courses from History, Economics, Philosophy and literature subjects which also integrate many aspects of Gender Sensitivity. The women development cell of the college also organises extension activities for spreading awareness about Women's rights, Gender justice, Domestic violence, Women health issues etc. Besides these, the college also organises events and competitions like, debate, quiz, speech etc. for developing gender sensitivity among students. Self defence training camps are also organised for giving students training on safety and security.

Human Values: The College is sensible towards human values and the students are taught various issues in respect of this. In Education, there are courses on Human Rights and Education, Philosophical and Social Foundation of Education, Value and Peace Education, Great Educational Thinkers, Emerging Issues in Education which addresses different human and social values. In addition to this, topics such as Education for National Integration and International Understanding, Discipline and Freedom, Democracy and Education, etc is taught in both Honours and Regular courses. In Economics there are courses on consumer behaviour, in English courses on Renaissance Humanism and various such courses from different departments addresses many human values.

Environment and Sustainability:

Environmental studies are offered as a core subject and each student compulsorily need to submit a project on diverse issues of environment. Besides this, many other courses from different departments such as Education, also have integrated topics on Environmental Education. Apart from this the students are also engaged in various extension activities on environmental issues through NSS, Environment protection cell,

Eco club etc. Initiations are also taken for promoting environmental awareness through tree plantation, campus and neighbourhood cleanliness drive, plastic free drive etc. Green Audit and Energy Audit are also conducted as a part of green initiation. Celebration of important days like World Environment day, Van Mohotsav, field trips etc. are organised to develop awareness regarding necessity of conservation of environment.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

Response:

In order to make teaching more effective The College has incorporated student centric methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies for enhancing learning experience:

Experiential learning

Excursion and field trips: Opportunities for experiential learning is provided to the students through excursions and field trips. Visit to historical places and nature tour etc. helps the students to enhance their knowledge and experience.

Extension Activities: The College also provides opportunities to expand student's awareness on various social issues through different extension activities undertaken by the NSS Cell of the college. Apart from that different departments also take initiative to engage students in field visit to do surveys on issues relating to Society and Community.

Laboratory Experiments: Experiment conducted in Psychological laboratory of education department helps the students to acquire variety of knowledge and experiences, develop reasoning ability and understand human psychology by conducting tests and experiments.

Participative learning:

Seminar and Workshop: The different departments of the college organises various seminar and

workshops for the students to provide them opportunity to present paper and participate actively. Students are encouraged to use ICT while doing seminar presentation.

Assignments and Project: Students are given assignments to test their writing skill and to develop their creative thinking activity. The department of Education, Assamese, History and Philosophy has compulsory Project work for the students. This helps in developing a research sentiment and research culture.

Wall Magazine and College Magazine: Writing for departmental wall magazines and college magazine help students to develop their thinking skill, writing skill and creativity.

Debate, Quiz and Speech: Debate, Quiz and Speech competitions organised by different departments helps students to acquire skills of researching, organising and presenting information in a compelling fashion. Speech competition and practice session on public Speaking skills eliminate the phobias of speaking in large gathering there by boosting their self confidence.

Problem solving ability:

Project work: Teacher led students project and curriculum based project encourage students to articulate problems and seek for its solution. This helps them to gain knowledge of research methodology and the ability to negotiate problem on their own.

Group Discussion: Different departments organise group discussion to promote communication ability, generate ideas, interpersonal skills.

Use of ICT in teaching learning: Teachers of the institution try to make the best use of technology available in the college in their teaching process. Power point presentations are made by all teachers and used for making teaching more students centric. The institute has well adopted the social media apps like whatsapp and YouTube for sharing useful links and resources to students for effective exchange of information. Many teachers also use Google classroom, Google meet, Zoom etc for online delivery of lessons. During the Covid-19 pandemic, the teachers of the institution switched over to virtual mode with limited technological facilities. Apart from the regular classes the students were assigned assignments & projects through online mode. QR Codes are developed by the departments for easy accessibility of question bank.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Internal assessment is an important part of student's assessment and evaluation process while conducting internal assessment the college adheres to the norms laid down by the affiliation university.

Method of Assessment: The tentative date for the Sessional examination is mentioned in the academic calendar and students are informed about it at the beginning of the academic session. Different parameter such as sessional exam, class test, assignment, class attendance, project field visit, group discussion, seminar and speech are taken for internal evaluation of each student. The examination committee of the college prepare the schedule for the internal examination. The date and time schedule of the examination is displayed in the college notice board and also uploaded in whatsapp group of each department for easy

availability of the students. The examination committee directs each department to set up question papers and submit to the committee within the stipulated time. The question paper is to be set only with the portion which has been covered in the class and students are well informed in advance about this.

Transparency in Assessment: The College conducts the examinations according to the rules and regulations set by the affiliating university. All the examination halls are under CCTV Surveillance and the AOC and invigilator closely monitor the process and ensure that no students adopt any unfair means in the examination halls. After the test answer sheets are distributed to the departments for evaluation. Once the evaluation is done and marks allotted, the papers are shown to the students for checking and identifying their mistake.

Mechanism for making vigorous & robust Assessment: In order to make the assessment process more vigorous and robust the college follows certain procedures/rules and regulation. The student's attendance percentage is calculated prior to the sessional examination and students with low percentage are informed in advance for rectification. There is a provision of retest in case any student remain absent on genuine ground.

Grievance Redressal:

The grievances raised by the students are taken seriously and redressed as early as possible within the stipulated period..

Grievance related to Internal Examination:

As the answer sheets are shown to the students the grievance regarding internal examinations are very few. In case of any grievance relating to evaluation students can report to the respective HODs and to the Grievance Redressal Cell. However the minor issues are sorted by the HOD's in the department itself. The college also has a complaint box where students can drop their complaints in writing regarding any issues.

Grievance related to External Examination:

For grievances regarding marks of a paper/ course, the college collects complaint from student in prescribed form and forwards to university. The main complaints of students are under marking, wrong marking, mismatch of name and Roll nos, mismatch in subject opted etc. as per the norms of Gauhati University if a student is not satisfied with the marks of end semester examination they can apply for re-scrutiny, photocopy and re-evaluation of their answer scripts by depositing prescribed fees.

The programme outcomes and Course outcomes constitute an integral part of the curriculum. Being an affiliated college under Gauhati University the college adheres to the framework of the university while progressing with the curriculum of the undergraduate courses.

The college has stated Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all academic programmes. POs and the COs are planned to ensure complete and comprehensive learning about the programme and courses the students undertake. POs will help the students to develop critical thinking, effective communication skill, desired social qualities and environmental consciousness whereas the COs is designed according to the specific courses that fulfil each PO and by following the Bloom's Taxonomy.

Following measures are taken to communicate POs and COs to the students and the stakeholders.

- Explained by each HOD in the first class at the beginning of the session.

Attainment of Programme outcomes and Course Outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

Response: The college ensures the expected POs and COs of the programme are attained to the maximum. Both direct and indirect methods are adopted for evaluating the attainment of POs & COs. The POs and the COs are briefed to the students in the beginning of the new academic session. The scope of each programme and each course is clearly defined through the induction programme and the attainment of POs & COs is measured within that scope.

Methods of measuring attainment

- Class test, Projects, Assignments, Field Visits are used to measure the students academic ability and potentialities.
- The Sessional examinations to assess and evaluate students on the basis of their performance and analysed of assessing the attainment level of programme outcomes and programme specific outcomes.
- The end semester examinations results are analysed by each department and records are maintained for future references.
- Seminars and workshops are organised for the students at departmental level to enhance their knowledge and information.
- Different mechanisms and strategies such as remedial classes, tutorial classes, and mentor-mentee system are used by the teachers to archive the POs & COs.
- The institution collects feedback from Students, Teachers, Alumni, Employers, and Parents which is an important method of measuring attainment level of Students in terms of programme, course and syllabus outcomes and to understand the impact of teaching learning process.
- Details of students' progression to higher studies in the institution of national repute are collected and are used as a measure to assess the attainment of learning levels. Their expertise is utilised to give proper orientation to the present students.
- The record of performance of students in various literary, cultural, fine arts and debate and

symposium etc are also maintained and are taken as an indicator of attainment of learning outcome.

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

Response:

Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya has created an ecosystem in the institution to promote innovation, transfer of knowledge and entrepreneurship. The college has set up various cells and committees for initiation for creation and transfer of knowledge.

Research and Development Cell: The College has established Research and Development cell with an aim to inculcate research culture and attitude among students and teachers. The cell monitors the research activities and also motivates the teachers and students to participate in research related activities.

Entrepreneurship Development cell: The college makes constant effort to encourage its students not only to absorb current knowledge but also to strive for development of a spirit of innovation through creation and transfer of new knowledge. Keeping in tune with its vision and mission the college gives much importance to the economic self sufficiency of the students. The entrepreneurship development cell, therefore, have taken an initiative to set up a cutting and tailoring centre and have introduced a 3 months certificate course on cutting and tailoring for its students and alumnae. Already two batches of students have completed their course and have become economically self dependent by pursuing it as a profession.

Yoga and Meditation: No education can succeed without a healthy body and a sound mind. Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya takes utmost care to cater to the needs of the students in this regard. Hence the college has introduced yoga and meditation course for its students so that they can develop themselves as

physically and mentally healthy individuals.

Guidance and Counselling cell: The Guidance and Counselling Cell organises various training programme/ activities, lectures on soft skill and personality, career opportunities and entrepreneurship development, coaching for competitive examinations etc.

Alumnae Initiation: For creation and transfer of knowledge the college has a provision of inviting its alumnae as guest speaker in different occasions. Many of its alumnae are well established in different government and private sectors and are expert in their respective field. Many of them have also developed themselves as young entrepreneurs and are economically well established. These alumnae have been taking voluntary initiation to share their knowledge with the students of the institution. The college thus, organises lectures, workshops and training programmes and interact with the present students from time to time in order to motivate and inspire them to charter a career in the field of their choice. It is a great privilege of the college that many of it's alumnae today are engaged in the college as faculty members and are rendering their service for the betterment of the institution.

Being a women educational institution Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya aims at empowering the young women not only by developing their scholastic abilities but also by developing their creative abilities in different co-scholastic activities. For this, the college encourages the students to participate in different games and sports and cultural activities so that they can gain confidence and establish themselves with this abilities. The NSS cell along with different departments of the college takes initiative to engage students in different such activities and also to participate actively in the extension activities carried out by the college. Since its inception our students have been taking active participation in various community services and have earned a place for themselves.

The students not only participate in the programmes organised by the college but also extend their participation in different other programmes that has been organised by the Government and other organisations. Every year our students participate in the Independence Day and Republic day parade and cultural programmes organised by the District administration and have been able to get awards many a time. The NSS volunteers participated in patriotic song competition organised by the District administration on the eve of Independence Day and have **won Gold Medal**. Our students Miss Pallabi Barman, Miss Rashmi Ray and Barnali Ghosh have brought laurels to the college by winning **1st, 2nd and 3rd prize** respectively in the **Speech Competition** organised by Bongaigaon refinery on the occasion of vigilance awareness week.

One of our student Miss Anju Ray is a **State Level Hockey Player** and have brought glory to the college by being selected for the **Assam Olympic Team**.

During Covid 19 pandemic our NSS volunteers extended their services to the society in various ways. One of our NSS volunteer Miss Chitrallekha Ray got appointed as **“Protirodhi Bandhu”** by district

administration for providing service in quarantine centre. Her service was recognised with a certificate by the district administration. It is also a pride for us that our students have been able to make the institution shine at the national level. Response:

Good infrastructure along with a barrier free and eco friendly environment is an important necessity for enhancing the quality of teaching- learning process of an educational institution. Keeping this in mind Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya has provided its students with the best possible learning facilities for their academic development. The college has adequate infrastructural facilities like adequate classrooms, laboratories, library, computer and common rooms.

The college expands its infrastructure systematically and continuously over the years as per the requirement of academic and administrative activities. The college has a campus area of 3037.80 sq mtr and built up area of 1366.42 sq mtr.

Classrooms: The College has three multi-storied buildings comprising of sixteen classrooms including two ICT enabled class rooms. All classrooms are well equipped with adequate number of desk benches and white boards/ Green boards. The classrooms are of different sizes and are adequate to accommodate the sanction strength.

Laboratory: There is one well equipped psychological laboratory in the department of education for conducting psychological test and experiments.

ICT Facilities: The College has one ICT enabled classrooms. However the installations of four smart classrooms funded by IOCL are in process. The campus is WI-FI enabled and students and faculty members can avail the facilities. The library of the college is automated with KOHA software (version: 20.0507.000). The office is using the software OZOERP for admission process and for examination and evaluation the college is using the software provided by the affiliating university.

Sports and Cultural facilities: In addition to the academic upliftment of the students, the college also tries to provide all necessary facilities to the students for developing their sports and cultural capabilities. The college shares a common playground with the parent institution Birjhora HS School for all outdoor games. As the present college campus has a shortage of space the college has signed a MoU with the authority of Public library and uses the public auditorium for all its cultural programmes. Apart from this the college provides all required sports materials to the students and encourages them to use these facilities for development of healthy body and mind.

Yoga Centre: Yoga is an excellent means of developing physically and mentally healthy individuals. Our college provides the facility to the students as well as the alumnae to practice yoga for better health. A separate yoga room is provided for the purpose.

Library: The library of the college is well furnished and has a very good sitting arrangement. The library has more than 5000 books, some periodicals, journals and Newspapers and e-resources such as N-List and Inlibnet. All the staff and students have access to these vast resources. Apart from this each department has

a departmental library for the use of the students from respective departments.

CCTV: CCTV is installed both inside and outside the classrooms which helps the administration in monitoring the activities within the college campus. All together there are 32 CCTV cameras installed in the college. It also ensures safety and security of the students and staff.

Additional Facilities: The College also has a sick room for students, ramp for divynjgan, A Generator, a canteen which serves healthy food in economic rate, drinking water facilities and a spacious girl's common room.

- The library is automated with the Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) KOHA ILMS software, version 20.0507.
- The Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) module of the Koha software allows library book searching by entering preferred terms and is mainly used for information retrieval.
- Book reservation facility, status of a book etc. can be found by using OPAC.
- The institution has membership of N-LIST for e-books and e-journals. It provides access to 6,000+ e-Journals and more than 1, 99,500+ e-Books.
- All the books have been classified with the Dewey Decimal Classification System.
- Circulation of books is done by using Koha software database.
- The Library has 3 (three) computers for the use of students.

Criterion 6 - Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 The governance and leadership is in accordance with vision and mission of the institution and it is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participation in the institutional governance

Response:

Piloted by its vision and mission Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya's committed towards developing it into a centre of excellence in higher education for women. The college initially was managed by a Governing Body comprising of Principal, Renowned Educationists of the region, guardian's representative, university nominees and representative of teaching and non-teaching/administrative staff. All academic programmes and activities were carried out under the supervision of governing body for overall development. In January 2013 the college was provincialised under the Assam Venture Educational Institution (Provincialisation of Services) Act 2011.

The effective leadership is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management.

The practice of decentralization and participatory management is affected in all the activities of the college including academic and administrative and co-curricular activities. All the stakeholders of the college including Governing body, The Principal, Faculty members Office staff, Students, Parents and Alumni work together in a democratic way for different strategies and plans.

The college has a mechanism of providing authority and operational autonomy to different cells and committees that are formed for planning and implementing different plans and policies academic, administrative and co-curricular. The IQAC ensures effective planning and implementation of all these activities through proper review and monitoring.

The IQAC functions as a co-ordinating body and monitoring cell and evaluates and upgrades the quality of the academic and administrative performance and institutionalises best practices.

The Organogram of the college clearly reflects the decentralized and organisational structure of the institution. The Governing body is at the apex of administrative setup followed by Principal, IQAC, Departments administrative staff, Student council and Committee. The principal as the head of academic and administrative setup provides leadership and guidance in planning organization and execution of all programmes with the active support and participation of all. The Governing body of the college meets from time to time to discuss different issues relating to finance, infrastructures, appointments of teaching and non-teaching and any other matters related to overall development of this college.

The HODs are given the responsibilities of looking after the departmental plans and programmes and ensure smooth functioning of the departments. Regular meetings are conducted to discuss different academic and co-curricular activities of the department.

The IOAC functions as the co-ordinating body to monitors the activities of different departments and cells and communities so that it is aligned with the college priorities.

The students council (BKMSU) works in co-ordination with Principal and different committees/cell. The member of the student council is also member of different committees.

The college provides opportunities to the students to develop awareness on social and national issues through seminar, workshop, projects, field studies and other extension activities.

The different committees like Academic committee, Alumnae committee, Anti-ragging committee etc. are given autonomy to prepare plans and strategies for effective fractioning of college.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, deployment of institutional Strategic/ perspective/development plan etc

Response:

The Organogram of the college depicts the institutional bodies that are responsible for creating and implementing the policies in an effective manner.

The Governing Body is at the apex of the Administration and management system of the institution and it is formed according to the guidelines of the Assam Government. The Principal acts as the Secretary and heads the college. The Governing Body, as the highest decision making body guides the college towards fulfilling its goals and objectives.

The Principal covers meeting with Governing Body, Teachers, Staff and Parents for discussing different matters pertaining to the college.

Different cells and committees are formed with representatives from teaching staff, non- teaching staff and with at least one student member to support different areas of the institutional function according to their mandate. These committees function under the overall guidance of the Principal.

The IQAC acts as a Coordinating Body and Monitoring Cell and looks after the sustenance and enhancement of the academic inputs and outputs. It also monitors teachers' performance with regard to regularity, punctuality, sincerity, accountability and teaching commitment.

For all administrative functions, the college follows the Administrative and Financial rules of the Govt. of Assam.

Issues of grievances and complaints are addressed by grievance redressal cell. Complaint boxes are kept at the outside of the girls' common room and near the entrance of the buildings. The university examination related grievances are forwarded to the affiliating university through Principal. However internal

examinations related grievances are dealt by the HODs.

Appointment, Service Rules, Promotion Policies, Performance:

The institution strictly follows the service rules of government of Assam. For Recruitment and appointment of the teaching and non- teaching staff the institution strictly adheres to the rules and regulations of U.G.C., Gauhati University and Government of Assam. Some service related matters which cannot be addressed by the internal mechanism is forwarded to DHE.

The teaching and non teaching staffs are entitled the benefit of GPF, NPS, Casual Leaves, Earned Leaves, and Maternity leaves and Paternity leaves.

As far as promotion is concerned, Performance Based Appraisal System Performa is followed based on API Score. IQAC plays a very important task of screening and scrutinising the documents and forwarding it to the DHE.

Deployment of strategic perspective plan:

For effective deployment of the institutional strategic plan the college has constituted various cells and committees including IQAC. The Principal along with the Advisory Committee, Academic Committee and IQAC frames out plans and policies to be implemented for better academic ambience. Apart from this all other cells and committees have the freedom to plan and make policies for implementation of all action throughout their terms. The Construction Committee plays an important role by making plans and budgets for suggested new developmental work and constructions and monitoring all construction related activities.

The completion of new Library building, the Administrative Block and the new classrooms by using the grants received from untied fund and Fund from CSR, IOCL Bongaigaon, is the example of deployment of strategic developmental plan.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures and Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

The existing government welfare schemes in accordance to U.G.C guidelines are available both teaching and non-teaching staff, following are the different welfare schemes available for teaching & non-teaching staff.

i. **Group Insurance:** The benefit of Group insurance policy of Government of Assam for its employers is available to all employees of the college.

ii. **GPP NPS:** As per Government rules NPS facility is available to all those teaching and non-teaching staff in the sanctioned post.

iii. **Gratuity:** As per State Government rules all teachers and employees in the sanctioned post enjoys gratuity offer the superannuation of service.

iv. **Medical allowance:** A monthly medical allowance as per Govt. rules can be drawn by all teachers and employees of the college.

v. **House rent:** All employees in the sanctioned post are eligible to draw a monthly house rent on the basis of their basic pay.

vi. **Leave Benefits:** Every employee of the college is entitled to a number of leave such as Casual leave, Academic leave, Duty leave, Maternity and Paternity leave, Earn leave etc. A special leave is also admissible to all employees on special occasion such as death of Parents, or marriage of self/son daughter, medical ground etc.

vii. **Contributory financial help:** The union of teaching and non-teaching staff of Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya has a provision of offering financial assistance to any employee for treatment of serious ailment or for any serious medical emergency. The fund is generated with the one-time contribution of each employee. This is purely situational and the fund is raised instantly and according to the seriousness of the situation.

The performance Appraisal Systems for both teaching and non-teaching staff is done on the basis of the records available. The IQAC collects all the information from each teacher about their academic achievements such as publications, seminars and conferences attended, papers presented participation in Orientation Programme (OP), Refresher Course (RC), Faculty Development Programme (FDP) and Short Term Course (STC). The Principal assesses the teaching and non-teaching staff on different parameters such as health, aptitude, attitude, initiative efficiency, punctuality, integrity, intelligence etc. Teacher's performance is also measured on the basis of their involvement in different co-curricular activities. These records are assessed at the time of promotion under CAS as per UGC guidelines. The recorded data is then

sent to the President of Governing body for review. The head of the Institution need to record the personal data and forward the same to DHE. Students' feedback is also taken to assess the performance of the teaching staff. The complaints or grievances against any teaching and non-teaching staff are taken seriously for overall assessment. Performance appraisal is mandatory for both teaching & non-teaching staff.

In the last five years the college has received grants for Students Excursion, Infrastructure Development Grant, Girls Common Room, and Sanitisation of college during Covid pandemic. All these grants are utilized as per State Govt. procedure and utilisation certificates are sent to the authority. The college follows a specific procedure to apply for grants/funds.

Grants received from IOCL, Bongaigaon: Apart from this the college also receives grants from IOCL, Bongaigaon under Corporate Social responsibility (CSR) for development of infrastructure. The New library building was constructed with the fund received from IOCL, Bongaigaon. The Governing body of the college, through Principal and Purchasing and Construction committee ensures proper utilisation of such grants/funds.

Grants from Other sources: The institution also has received grants from **MLA Untied funds** for infrastructure augmentation. Financial resources are also generated through **Krishna Kanta Handiqui State Open University** study centre.

Besides these the college also generates funds from certificate courses fees and alumnae contribution. The procedure of resource mobilisation is very transparent and utilisation of fund is done according to the Govt. guidelines and as per the norm laid down by the funding agencies.

The Assam Cooperative Apex bank and the State Bank of India are the main banks of the college. The accounts are opened under different head and funds are immediately/automatically transferred to the bank account. Each account is audited and utilisation certificate is submitted after the completion of the work. The Governing Body of the college approves all the expenditures and utilisation certificate.

The college also has a provision of generating fund from venue charges, centre fees, received from different organisations for holding various examinations and organising meetings, training etc. Apart from that the college also generates fund by giving the canteen and a Xerox centre on rent.

Internal and External audit: The college conducts regular Internal and external audits. There is a two tier financial audit system in the college which involves (a) audit by a local Chartered accountant, (b) External Government audit.

The internal audit is a continuous process which is carried out by CA. All bills, vouchers and stock registers are checked and verified by the auditors. The final audit report received from CA is placed before GB by the principal.

The Government audit is carried out by the Directorate of Audit (Local Fund) Govt. of Assam. The audit is done according to their schedule, assessment of Income- Expenditure and Receipt- Payment is checked following the government rule.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

The IQAC of the college plays a very significant role in ensuring the quality of administrative and academic functioning. It also reviews the teaching learning process, structures and methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Meeting with HODs and Cell Coordinators

The IQAC conducts regular meetings with the Principal, HODs and coordinators of different cells and committees and put forward different suggestions for quality improvement. Different cell coordinators are encouraged to do more extension activities by involving the students.

Workshops, Webinars and Faculty Development Programme (FDP): The IQAC of the college organises workshops /webinars/ FDPs for teachers and also motivates them to join these programmes for updating their teaching methodologies and skills with changing time. During the Covid 19 pandemic, the IQAC organised **various webinars and a week-long Faculty Development Programme** for teachers.

Mentoring : For providing guidance and support to the students, the college follows a carefully planned mentoring system. Each teacher is appointed as a mentor and he/she discusses all academic, and non-academic issues of the students and tries to solve their problems..

Literary and Cultural Forum: For inculcating the creative qualities of the students a Literary and

Cultural forum was formed. The main aim of establishing the forum was to guide and support the students in developing different cultural and literary abilities.

Teacher's Diary: In order to make teaching- learning process more systematic the IQAC has prepared a teacher's diary containing the date, class, content and activities of the day and each faculty member has to maintain it and record daily activities in it. The Teacher's Diary is submitted to the IQAC periodically for monitoring and recording.

Course File: IQAC has also initiated a process of maintaining a course file by each faculty member containing the mission and vision of the departments, programme outcome and course outcome, routine, syllabus, teaching plan, lecture notes results etc.

Learning Assessment Test: In order to know the advance and slow learner of the class different departments conduct a learning assessment test for the first semester students of the college. Each department has the freedom to conduct the test according to their suitability.

BKM Super 10: The IQAC has also taken the initiation to identify the advance learners by a carefully designed systematic test for forming BKM Super 10 group. The top 10 students are selected through a written objective test of General Knowledge, English and current affairs and a Viva- Voce. The main objective of forming this group is to provide them with extra support and Guidance for their career prospects.

Response:

The college has implemented several measures to provide an inclusive environment. As the college is situated in an area which has mix populations comprising of many ethnic communities like, Rajbongshis, Bodos Tea tribes, Rabha, Garo etc. it has always been promoting values of tolerance, harmony and inclusiveness to students. Students coming from different communities with caste, religion, culture and linguistic differences remain in the same academic environment with unity and integrity.

The Institution provides **free access** to all the sections of the society irrespective of caste, creed, religion, language etc. In order to ensure equal opportunity the college follows the state govt reservation guidelines in admission procedure.

Free admission/ fee waving is granted to the students coming from the Below Poverty line (BPL) as a measure of providing opportunity of higher education to the girls without exerting financial burden on the families.

The college also promotes several **financial assistance/ Scholarships/Freeship** provided by the Central Govt and the State Govt.

As the college has students from both vernacular medium as well as from English medium all the faculty members adopts a **bi-lingual method** (English and Assamese) as medium of instruction for ease of understanding of the students.

Throughout the year students are exposed to different activities in order to sensitize them towards human and social values and promote tolerance and harmony.

Apart from annual college festivals the college also **organises various cultural and sports programmes** on different occasions which acquaints the students with the cultural diversity of the nation.

Various departmental activities such as **seminars, workshop, essay and speech competition, recitation etc helps in promoting communal harmony and tolerance among the students. Games and sports** organised in the college develop a team spirit and coordination and helps in developing the necessary social values.

Observance of different days of national importance such as Independence Day, Republic Day Gandhi Jayanti, National Unity Day, etc helps in developing a feeling of patriotism and unity among the students and the employees.

National Voters Day and Constitutional Day is observed in the college every year. Response:

Best Practice 1.

Title: Academic Awards for students as an initiative towards progression and placements.

Objectives:

Positive recognition is an excellent way to motivate the students for progression. Keeping this in mind Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya have introduced two special awards as **Principal's Award** and **Nabajyoti Saikia Memorial Award**. The main objectives of giving these awards are to appreciate the hard work of the students and to encourage a healthy competition among them. It also aims at creating a better academic ambience in the college.

The context:

Awards and accolades encourage and motivates the students to do hard work and brings along with it zeal and enthusiasm to learn new things. At Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya, we always believe that by recognising the achievements of the students we can ignite a spark in them to put feathers to their dream, develop their self esteem and can make them stand up as achievers. Keeping this in mind the college has initiated various awards for academic achievements of students and to motivate them towards progression of higher education.

The Practice:

Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya conceived an idea of awarding the students for excellent academic performance in their university examination. The main aim of these awards was to encourage and motivate the students to achieve academic excellence. The two main awards are Principal's award and Nabajyoti Saikia Memorial award. Apart from this, the college also has a provision of felicitating the students who achieve a first class in their final university examination. The awards are given away every year at a ceremonial function on the day of fresher's social. The idea behind this is to encourage and motivate the new comers for achieving academic excellence.

Evidence:

The practice was initiated in 2006. Since then every year number of students are receiving these awards. The success of this practice is that number of students getting first class has increased over the years. This proves that the practice of giving awards and felicitations have motivated the students and have developed in them a zeal and enthusiasm to achieve greater success in their academic performances. Besides these, some of the recipients of the Principal's Award and Nabajyoti Saikia Memorial Awards have also been able to achieve success and top at the Post Graduate level as well. Moreover, the previous recipients of the awards have not only progressed to higher education but also have been very well placed in government sector including civil services. This can be regarded as the evidence of success of the practice.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The initiation for forming the trust was taken by the then Principal Mr. Prabin Barman with support from Mr. P Dewri, husband of Late Nabajyoti saikia and the teachers of Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya. However, with the transfer and retirement of Mr. Dewri from Bongaigaon, the trust faced a financial crisis. Moreover, with the change of principal it was also difficult for the new Principal to continue and manage the trust. However, with the goodwill of the Principal and cooperation of the faculty members somehow the practice continues till date.

Best Practice 2

Title: Developing social values and fostering social responsibilities among students through Community Engagement.

Objectives:

Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya is a premier institution of higher education for women. The main aim of establishing this college was to empower the women of the region not only by developing their cognitive domain but also by developing their conative and affective domain. Hence the institution tries to give opportunities to the students to work in the neighbouring areas with an aim of developing social values and fostering social responsibilities among the students.

Context:

The institution strongly believes that dissemination of knowledge cannot be an isolated academic endeavour; it is also related with development of social values and responsibilities. Hence the institution tries to inculcate a feeling of social responsibilities among students by exposing them to work for different social issues through field study and community engagement.

Practice:

The Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya makes a constant effort to engage the students in social work from time to time through departments and different cells. This practice has been adopted in order to **accomplish one of the mission statements of the college as developing social values and stimulating respect and sensitivity for others.** For this throughout the year extension programmes are organised in different nearby areas consisting the people of the under privileged classes. The students and the NSS volunteers along with the teachers are also engaged in various community works in the adopted villages. Apart from the extension activities the college also engages students in project work on different social issues organizes field trips and excursion.

Evidence of success:

The success of this practice can be noted by the service of the alumnae of the college towards society even after leaving the institution. Many of our students and alumnae are engaged in different social work such as working for the underprivileged children, transgender, the slum dwellers etc. Some of our alumnae are also working for the welfare of the children and women in both private and govt. sector

Durning the recent Covid 19 pandemic our NSS Volunteers have provided the best services towards society. They adopted various measures to spread awareness among the masses regarding the importance of washing hands, need of sanitization and wearing mask etc.

One of the NSS Volunteer, Miss Chitrlekha Ray was appointed ‘Protirodhi Bandhu’ by district administration for **giving services in the quarantine centre.**

Problems encounter and resources required:

The main problem of carrying out these activities is allocation of fund. As the college does not receive any fund or sponsorship for doing this kind of community services, the departments have to bear the expenses.If proper funding is available these programmes can be extended further to a larger area.

Sometimes problem is also encountered from parents side as they are reluctant to send their daughters for participating in the programmes conducted outside the campus.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya is the only women college in the district. The vision of the college is to develop it into a centre of excellence in higher education for women through comprehensive and balanced education. As such, the institution is committed to the cause of empowerment of women from all sectors including those socially and economically deprived through access to higher education

Starting its journey on 20th August 1993 with a small group of students the college, today has developed into a premier institution for girls in the region. Though situated at the heart of the town the college has students from different ethnic communities having different languages, custom and traditions mainly the Koch Rajbonshis, Bengalis, Bodos, Tea tribes and the Religious Minority group. The college thus, tries to create an ambience of growth and inclusiveness by inculcating the values of respect for other languages, religion and culture.

The main feature which makes the institution distinct from others is its constant effort to develop each student of the college into an empowered woman. As envisaged in its mission the college continuously strives for the enrichment of society by developing intellectual and self confident women with scientific temperament, humanitarian and social values. Focusing on the thrust area the institution makes a sincere effort to engage students in various community services in the neighbourhood areas like cleaning the market area, awareness campaign, cleanliness drive, donating at the orphanages etc. In order to guide the students on what should be their role as socially responsible individual the college has adopted villages viz. Chitkagaon and Kakoijana comprising of Rabha tribe. The main aim of adopting these villages is to develop awareness about sachhwata, health, education, women empowerment etc. among the villagers.

The NSS cell of the college undertakes different programmes for the community development throughout the year. The NSS volunteers take active participation in different social activities and for the upliftment of the rural women by organizing special camps in the adopted villages, Chitakagaon Rabha Para, Kakoijana and Sawnagaon. During the time of Covid 19 pandemic our NSS volunteers took several measures for spreading awareness among the masses. Apart from distributing mask and food they also took the help of social media such as YouTube and face book to sensitize the people regarding the precautionary measures. These activities have definitely helped in developing social responsibilities and social values among the students.

The college also gives equal importance to the development of students through cultural and literary activities. Students are given opportunities to explore their creative abilities in different fields during college festivals; fresher's social and through different competitions held in the college. Many of our students have represented the college in the University Youth festivals organized by the affiliating University and have bagged prizes in different events. Some of them have also shined at the national level competitions and have brought laurels to the college. The college makes a continuous effort to identify such talents and train them accordingly. In order to develop the literary skill of the students, the college regularly publishes an annual magazine "TONOYA" with an aim to showcase the creativity of the students in literary field. Apart from this each department has a wall magazine for developing the creativity of the students in literature. Many of our alumnae today are economically well settled in cultural and literature field. The college has produced Civil Servants, Lawyers, Professors, and Teachers etc by providing general education, but at the same time the college has also produced writers, dancers, singers, actors who are well settled in their respective life.

The college also organizes various programmes for developing the creative skills of the students.

Workshops are organized on ability enhancement techniques, recitation skill, communication skill, mental health and management, vocational training and self employment etc. for giving the students exposure in the respective areas. Various other programmes like guidance and counselling, health awareness, human rights awareness, field visits, excursion etc. are also organized for the students to develop their knowledge as well as to give opportunity of experiential learning.

Another feature that makes the college stand out amongst the other colleges is that it has given the opportunity to many of its alumnae to serve in the college after completion of their degree. Almost every department has one alumna working as Assistant Professor. This proves that the effort of the college to accomplish its mission has been fulfilled upto some extent but the college strives for more in the coming years.

Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya not only gives importance on development of academic aspects but also give equal importance on the physical and mental well- being of the student. For this the college has a provision of certificate course on yoga and organizes special camps for self defence technique. The students are also given yoga and meditation classes regularly thrice a week by specially trained teacher. In the present competitive world the students have to face a lot of challenges which in turns develops stress, anxiety, frustration, depression and many other kinds of mental illness. Hence, it becomes very important for an educational institution to train their students with the methods and techniques of handling such kind of negative feelings and emotions in an effective manner. Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya has initiated the process of developing a sound mind along with a sound body and this can be referred as a distinctive quality of the institution.

Vocational and skill based education is an important means of women empowerment. The New Education policy 2022 has also recommended for introduction of vocational education right from the school stage. Since its inception, Birjhora Kanya Mahavidyalaya has been contributing significantly towards women empowerment through quality education. But looking into the need and demand of skill based education, the institution has also initiated 3 months certificate course in cutting and tailoring for the students and alumnae of the college. Already many students have successfully completed the course and have become economically self reliant by taking it as a profession.
